Between 1946-58, the United States detonated 23 nuclear devices at Bikini Atoll, including 20 hydrogen bombs cumulatively yielding the energetic equivalent of 78.52 megatons (78.52 million tons) of TNT. Among those was the Castle Bravo H-bomb test which yielded 15 megatons, one thousand times more powerful than the 15-kiloton bomb which destroyed Hiroshima. The 167 inhabitants of Bikini Atoll who were relocated to a nearby island were still exposed to immensely dangerous levels of radiation.

The horrendous actions taken against humanity on Bikini Atoll were conveniently overshadowed by an "explosive" new swimsuit debuted the same week as the first bomb test by French designer Louis Réard: the bikini. To this day, the bikini continues its tradition of surfing waves of toxicity, symbolizing the over-sexualization and objectification of female pro surfers.

Nicole Naone is a weapon of Kanaka Maoli and Korean ancestry whose practice spans film, sculpture, and virtual reality. An alumna of the prestigious Sundance Institute Indigenous Program, the University of Hawaiʻi at Mānoa (BFA), and Kamehameha Schools (Kapālama), Naone is celebrated for her influential film works, including the landmark feature film WAIKIKI (2020) and her MTV spot Hawaiians, Unite (2021). Her extensively cited installations, such as Mauna Fuji (2014), Kalaoke o Mākua (2019), PIKO (2021), and Bikini and the Bikini (2023), are the result of her frontline engagement with activism and exemplify her pivotal role at the intersection of art and justice for the Hawaiian community. Currently, she is deeply committed to the protection of Maunakea through HŌʻĀ Hawaiʻi and the repatriation of Hawaiian ancestral remains with Hui Iwi Kuamoo.
